## ACCESSIBILITY:

The source files can be opened and edited using any ODF writer which includes:

- OpenOffice (free download) http://www.openoffice.org/
- LibreOffice (free download) http://www.libreoffice.org/
- Microsoft Word 2007 SP2 (or later)

The .ZIP files can be extracted using the OpenSource software 7Zip which is freely downloadable at: <a href="http://www.7-zip.org/download.html">http://www.7-zip.org/download.html</a>

For a simple way to extract the .ZIP file, first download and install 7Zip. Create a folder on your desktop, add the .ZIP file, right-click that file, from the menu go to 7Zip, select 'Extract Here' and the files will appear in that new folder.
